Yolo Land Trust 2018 Annual Report

The Yolo Land Trust is devoted to one simple and vital mission, to conserve farmland in Yolo County. We have a track record of success built upon collaboration, respectful partnerships and land preservation expertise that allow us to create solutions that benefit both the land and the landowner. **Since 1988, the Yolo Land Trust has preserved more than 11,000 acres as farmland forever.**



Acquisition of Agricultural Conservation Easement

We added one new agricultural conservation easement to our conservation portfolio in 2018. The Haag Walnut Orchard, located in Esparto, is YLT's 65th easement property. Thanks to the efforts of the owners, Jim and Claire Haag, and the Yolo Land Trust, the farm will remain in agriculture permanently.

Funding for the conservation easement project was provided by a grant from the State of California Sustainable Agricultural Lands Conservation (SALC) Program. SALC is a California Strategic Growth Council program administered by the Department of Conservation. Additional grant funding was provided by Yolo County, the John and Eunice Davidson Fund, and Pacific Gas and Electric Company. The Haags also made a significant contribution to the Yolo Land Trust to complete the transaction.


The Haag Walnut Orchard will remain privately owned and on the County tax rolls. No further public investment will be required to keep the land in productive agriculture or for the annual monitoring by the Yolo Land Trust.

Monitoring Existing Conservation Portfolio

One of our fundamental annual tasks is monitoring our conservation portfolio. Conservation Associate Jessica Grant, visits each of our 64 easement properties to note the farming activities. With an iPad in hand, Grant walks around the farm to confirm all the easement terms are being followed. Several growers accompanied her on the 2018 visits to describe changes to their farm or to highlight a particular feature. We are very grateful to our conservation landowners for their commitment to farmland preservation.

Elkhorn Microbes

In the summer of 2018, the Yolo Land Trust hosted scientists from the South San Francisco-based microbiome company, Second Genome, to gather diverse environmental samples, such as agricultural and natural soils, river water, and various plant species. These samples are being evaluated for the presence of microbes that can contribute to plant health, with the potential of being included in farmers' future agricultural practices. We wish Second Genome much success in their endeavor to contribute to the toolbox of methods that will benefit farmers and agriculture.
